We're so very grateful to all of them and so appreciate of their collaboration and their friendship!

My name is Lucy Mathenge and I work as Administrator at Network for Ecofarming in Africa (NECOFA) and with Friends of Kenya Schools and Wildlife (FKSW). I joined NECOFA in 2006, the same year that the 2 organizations joined hands in partnership towards community development projects in Kajiado, Meru, Isiolo, Baringo and Nakuru Counties. Since then, I have been the personal assistant to the late Mr. Samuel Muhunyu who, until his demise, was NECOFA's Director. I am proud of this position. It has been a golden opportunity to have a person who mentored and shaped me to who I am today. I miss Mr. Muhunyu every day.

Working with Madam Gwen Meyer and John Neumeister has been an added advantage to me in learning about community development. I've been actively involved in implementing

the projects funded through FKSW and have helped to ensure positive results. I appreciate FKSW's passion and tireless fundraising to improve livelihoods of the less fortunate here through education, community health, food security, water and sanitation. My name is John Munene. I am a farmer and a businessman, and I am also a trained Agriculture Engineer. I have a passion in supporting communities. I met Samuel Muhunyu, the executive director of Network for Eco-Farming in Africa (NECOFA) in 2003 when I attended a farmers' meeting organized by the Ministry of Agriculture Officer in my area. Samuel was among the facilitators. After the meeting, he invited me to his office to give me more information about NECOFA and I developed an interest in NECOFA'S activities. Later, I became a Board Member and then became Chairman of the Board, the position I hold to date.



Since 2006 the NECOFA/FKSW partnership has benefited many communities in Education, Environmental Conservation, Health, Food Security and Nutrition and I have seen much progress and development. Schools supported by FKSW are in areas of extreme hardship, where even getting a teacher is a big challenge because no teachers from other regions want to work in such areas. Other benefits from interventions by the partnership include health care through the establishment of a dispensary in Kachiuru, where people had limited access to a health facility. We are very grateful to Gwen and John and FKSW because communities now have a better standard of living. Following the demise of Samuel, the NECOFA Board of Management appointed me as the Director of NECOFA, a position that I humbly accepted to ensure continuity of Samuel's great work and future dreams. I will do my best to keep his dreams alive and carry on his Legacy. Our partnership with FKSW will continue as before and we pray that we will be strong as we keep on supporting the needy communities.

My name is Jane Karanja, the first-born daughter to the late Mr. Samuel Muhunyu. Since my graduation from the University of Gastronomic Sciences in Pollenzo, Italy in 2009, I have worked with Mr. Samuel and NECOFA as Program Coordinator.
